Nevertheless, John Hancock boldly affixed his signature with a flourish and stepping back uttered these immortal words: “There! His Majesty can now read my name without his spectacles, and can double His reward of 500 of pounds on my head. That is my defiance!” Another noteworthy Signer forgotten with time’s swift passage was a man named Stephen Hopkins. He was seriously affected with palsy. After signing the Declaration his hands were observed to be visibly shaking. He carefully handed the quill to William Ellery and spoke these words: “My hands tremble, but my heart does not.” These men were owners of large plantations. They were wealthy merchants. They were men of means. They were well educated men. Yet they unhesitatingly signed all the while knowing everything could be lost. And it could even have been their death warrant. Carter Braxton of Virginia for example was a wealthy plantation owner and trader. The British navy destroyed his entire fleet of ships. Such strength of character had this man that he sold his estate in an effort to pay his debts. He died impoverished and in rags. John Morton was shunned by his Quaker friends and family for signing the Declaration. His final words as he lay on his death bed: “Tell them that they will live to see the hour when they shall acknowledge it to have been the most glorious service that I have ever rendered to my country.” Yes, meet the men who were instrumental in founding the only nation in the history of the world based on Bible principles. The men who so unselfishly sacrificed everything to give us our freedoms. These were the men who made it happen!
